As the cost of education continues to rise and students struggle to reduce the amount of loans that will accompany their diploma, it is critical that students are aware of all financial resources early in their academic career. The Scholarship Office provides multiple scholarship resources such as the University's new central scholarship system, the NinerScholars Portal, external scholarship lists, and general best practices for identifying scholarship funding.

The University Scholarship Office believes the best way to communicate and build a rapport with students is in-person. They hope that you will allow them to give a 3-5-minute presentation in your class in order to share these resources with your students. Advising Holds

With registration right around the corner, it is that time to place advising holds on students' accounts. Requests should be submitted to Beth Dawson at edawson8@uncc.edu by **Monday, February 27**.

In an effort to ensure advising holds are placed accurately and in a timely manner, departments are asked to send an Excel spreadsheet that includes a complete list of students needing advising holds. These spreadsheets can be retrieved from Report Central. A report that could be used is the Cumulative GPA by level, class, college, degree in major order report under the GPA/Credit Hours tab.

Please note:

- Freshman automatically receive an advising hold so these students (class of FR) should be excluded from your request.
- Exclude students who have applied to graduate for the current term.
- If you require a custom message to appear with the advising hold (limit of 30 characters), please include it with your request. (e.g., Contact PBUS advisor)
- One request per department should be submitted.
- Include students who are enrolled in their 4th semester as part of the Graduation Oriented Advising initiative.

Funding Opportunity

2nd Annual Targeted Research Internal Seed Program (TRISP) for 2017

The Charlotte Research Institute (CRI) announces its second annual Targeted Research Internal Seed Program (TRISP) for 2017. Serving as a catalyst for UNC Charlotte faculty, TRISP offers internal funds intended to:

- 1) help generate more compelling grant submissions to federal agencies,
- 2) initiate new intellectual directions for our faculty, and
- 3) foster new relationships across colleges, departments or centers.

Key considerations include the likelihood that the project can be leveraged to obtain new externally-funded research from mission oriented funding agencies such as DoD, DoE, DoT, DHS, etc. (typically not NSF or NIH), and whether the project cannot be otherwise initiated using regular department or college resources. In its inaugural competition, CRI made 10 TRISP awards totaling nearly \$380,000, and the program is already generating exciting results.
