#### Who Ya Gonna Call? Essential Speed-Dials for All Your University Problems

This program, offered by the Office of Legal Affairs, is an extension of a session offered at their recent Annual Symposium addressing discrimination, harassment, and retaliation. Presenters — Sam Sears, Deputy General Counsel, and Jeanne Madorin, Executive Director of Human Resources for Employee Relations — will provide an overview of a number of UNC Charlotte policies that govern the workplace, including University policies outlining the rights of employees with disabilities, the rights of employees who qualify for protected leave under the FMLA, and the policies prohibiting discrimination, harassment, and retaliation. The presenters will then discuss scenarios related to these topics and, as suggested by the title of the program, identify campus resources available to faculty and staff to help navigate these challenging issues. The program may be particularly useful for supervisors, who are obligated to ensure appropriate implementation of applicable University policies when relevant employee requests or complaints surface within their department or units.
