Provost's Awards for Excellence

The deadline for the Provost's Awards has been extended to **March 30, 2018**. Nominations for both awards may be sent electronically to <u>Shannon.Homesley@uncc.edu</u>.

The <u>Provost's Award for Excellence in Teaching</u> is granted to an academic department, program, or unit in recognition of the collective responsibility of faculty members for maintaining high-quality teaching. The award is intended to recognize documented efforts that improve student learning and outcomes.

The <u>Provost's Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Academic Advising</u> is granted to an advising center, academic department, program, or unit in recognition of the collective responsibility of faculty and staff members for maintaining high-quality undergraduate academic advising. The award is intended to recognize sustained efforts that assist students to achieve their educational and lifelong learning goals.

Catalog Edits

As a reminder, Colleges and their Academic Departments may make edits to the catalog text describing their college or department via <u>Curriculog</u> using Form #9. Word documents for editing will not be emailed for mark-up as they have been in the past. Any edits to these descriptions should be submitted by **April 30** for inclusion in the 2018-2019 Catalogs. Please note, however:


- Changes to Degree Programs must be done in Curriculog using the Program Revision form.
- Changes to Courses must be done in Curriculog using the Course Revision form.

Instructions to preview and make edits to catalog sections pertaining to College/Department descriptions are available on the <u>Faculty Governance website</u>. At this time, only colleges and their respective academic departments should submit their description edits via this new Curriculog Form #9. Other campus departments will be sent instructions via email on how to make changes to their non-curricular catalog content.

Writing Resources Center Seeks Student Tutors

The Writing Resources Center needs your help! They are looking for outstanding students who are strong writers and readers and who enjoy working with their peers to serve as tutors in the center. The WRC is particularly looking for rising sophomores and juniors across disciplines, but rising seniors should also consider applying for the course if they think it would be a good match for their interests. This class is recommended for anyone who is considering working in a field that requires a great deal of written and oral communication; who is planning on attending graduate school; who is looking to improve his or her writing; or who is hoping to go into education. This class does not have any prerequisites, but an application process is required. Applications for the Fall 2018 tutoring training course (English 4400) will be due March 26. After successful completion of the course, and with the permission of the director, students can subsequently tutor for pay in the center.

University Writing Program Wins Certificate of Excellence



NC Charlotte's University Writing Program has earned a 2017-2018 CCCC Writing Program Certificate of Excellence, as one of only nine honorees to receive the national award. The award was presented on Friday, March 16 at the Conference on College Composition and Communication's annual convention in Kansas City, Mo. CCCC is a constituent organization within the National Council of Teachers of English. Established in 2004, this national award honors up to 20 writing programs a year. To be eligible for this award, programs must be able to demonstrate that the program imaginatively addresses the needs and opportunities of its students, instructors, institution, and locale; offers exemplary ongoing professional development for faculty of all ranks, including adjunct and contingent faculty; treats contingent faculty respectfully, humanely, and professionally; uses the best current practices in the field; shows that the program administrator has academic credentials in writing; uses effective, ongoing assessment; uses effective placement procedures; creates appropriate class sizes; and models diversity and serves diverse communities.

The dissertation defense is one of the ways a new scholar demonstrates readiness to join the academy and is an opportunity to share their research widely.
