## Spring 2018 Final Exam Schedule Now Posted

The Spring 2018 Detailed Final Exam Schedule provides exam day, time, and room locations for all on-campus courses. The exam schedule is now posted on the Office of the Registrar <u>website</u>. ## Course Hero - Woodrow Wilson Fellowship for Excellence in Teaching

Junior faculty may want to apply for the the <u>Course Hero–WW Fellowship</u>, which is accepting applications through April 30, 2018. Applicants may not be going up for tenure during the award year (2018-19). Fellows will receive a one-year grant of \$40,000 -- approximately \$30,000 to support the engagement of a student assistant and the balance to be used for research and travel support. Fellows may be working in any field in the arts and sciences or in a business school. Exceptional candidates for the program teach in ways that:

- build student confidence and mastery of a subject;
- encourage critical thinking;
- explore foundational concepts through the lens of broader themes and global events;
- promote the power of learning communities beyond the classroom;
- leverage technology to complement the classroom experience;
- consider and serve different learning styles;
- prepare students for lifelong learning; and
- can serve as replicable teaching models for other educators.

#### Women's Leadership Development Program



The Women's Leadership Development Program will begin its eighth cohort this fall. This cohort-based women's leadership conversation series was developed for student leaders to interact with and learn from women leaders in our community. Experienced leaders in our community will share their stories, answer questions and engage in conversations with UNC Charlotte students about their personal experiences as women leaders. Assessments of the program have shown that:

- The women selected for the program achieved gains, as a group, in confidence upon completion of the program.
- The women expressed the importance of building a support network and continued learning, while continuing to focus on inclusive leadership, in overcoming barriers.
- The women clarified their definitions of leadership, focusing on a couple of key points rather than listing several descriptors.

Please nominate up to five students who you believe would benefit from and contribute to the program in meaningful ways. The focus of this program is most appropriate for undergraduate students who will have junior or senior standing in the fall. In order to nominate students, email Mindy Sides-Walsh by Friday, April 6, with the students' names and email addresses. Each nominee will be contacted and invited to complete an application for the Fall 2018 program.
