Women in STEM: Challenging Gender Stereotypes



Students, faculty, and staff are invited to join Dr. Laura Puaca for a discussion of Women in STEM: Challenging Gender Stereotypes. Laura Micheletti Puaca, author of *Searching for Scientific Womanpower: Technocratic Feminism and the Politics of National Security, 1940-1980*, and assistant professor of history at Christopher Newport University, will lead a discussion of past and present "technofeminism". Her research traces contemporary feminist interest in science to the World War II and Cold War years. Anxiety over America's supply of scientific brainpower was matched by suspicion about women's rights. Puaca discusses the ways in which feminist reformers

navigated these concerns to advance women's education and employment, laying the groundwork for the proliferation of women's societies in science and feminist reforms in science and society.

Transforming STEM Teaching and Learning Academy

The Transforming STEM Teaching and Learning Academy is currently accepting applications. The goals of the academy are:

- To introduce STEM faculty to the latest research on cognitive science.
- To expose STEM faculty to a variety of pedagogical techniques that have been successfully used in STEM courses.
- To support faculty as they adopt evidence-based best practices in their courses.

Participation in this academy entails a two year commitment. During the first year members will learn about evidence-based practices that have been used in STEM classrooms to increase student success. In the spring of Year 1, faculty will make small changes in the way they teach a critical progression course. During Year 2 faculty will significantly revise this course in an effort to increase student success.

Members of the academy will receive \$2000 (\$1000 for each year they participate) and will be eligible to apply for additional funding to support travel to STEM education conferences, to bring in disciplinary consultants, and/or to utilize embedded tutors.

This faculty learning academy is open to all faculty who teach critical progression STEM courses. This academy uses a broad definition of STEM that includes not only math and the hard sciences but also accounting, economics,

computing and informatics, the health sciences, and architecture. The deadline to submit <u>applications</u> is April 10. Please contact <u>Dr. Kathy Asala</u> with questions.
