M.Ed. in Teaching English as Second Language (TESL)

Teaching English as Second Language will be offered as a concentration within the M.Ed. in Curriculum and Instruction program beginning Spring 2019.

NinerScholars Portal Open to 2019-20 Scholarship Applications

The NinerScholars Portal is now open for students to begin applying for scholarship for the 2019-20 academic year. As a reminder, if your college or department has not completed the Scholarship Content Review Process, you'll need to do so before the University Scholarship Office can open your application to students. Scholarship funds which currently do not have a sufficient balance to make a 2019-20 award, but receive the necessary funding to make an award before February 1, 2019, may still be opened in NinerScholars. Please contact the University Scholarship Office (USO) if a scholarship that is currently closed to applications should be opened. The USO will host a training session for the NinerScholars Administrator and Reviewer Portals in early February. The session will offer resources and in-depth training on current and new functionality in the portals. The system enhancements will streamline your application review, recipient selection, and award administration processes. All new and continuing scholarship administrators are encouraged to attend; more details will be made available in the coming month.
