Spring 2019 and Session B Final Grades

Final Grades for the Spring 2019 term and the Session B term can be submitted through My UNC Charlotte starting on April 26. Grades are due by noon on May 13. After 12:00 p.m., instructors will not have access to submit grades online. For each student, select the appropriate grade from the drop down menu. Students that have officially withdrawn from the course have received a grade of "W" or "WE" and do not need a grade assigned. If a student has never attended the course (and they do not have a grade of "W" or "WE") then assign the grade of "F" from the grade drop down menu. A grade of "I" is assigned at your discretion when a student who is otherwise passing has not completed all the work in a course due to circumstances beyond his/her control. A grade of "IP" is only assigned for prearranged courses extending over more than one semester and is NOT to be used as a substitute for an Incomplete. Final grades can also be submitted to Banner using Canvas. Canvas can be accessed through your My UNC Charlotte account. A list of appropriate grades is below:
