Mid-Semester Grade Report Opens September 18

The Mid-Semester Grade Report opens Wednesday, September 18. Please submit the following by October 4 by noon. Please refer to the <u>midterm grading instructions</u> for more information.

- 1. Unsatisfactory Progress
 - Beginning on Wednesday, September 18, web grading capability will be available for faculty to assign Unsatisfactory Progress grades for all students. If you are unable to access your class list to assign unsatisfactory grades, please contact Elise Mickey in the Office of the Registrar at ext. 7-5485. Please note that this process is only to solicit unsatisfactory progress, not a grade for all students.
- 2. Courses with All Satisfactory Grades
 Faculty are asked to report if all grades are satisfactory in the course in addition to submitting unsatisfactory grades.

Enter your unsatisfactory grades using My UNC Charlotte. If you have a student who has stopped attending or never attended class, award that student an unsatisfactory grade ("F" for undergraduate level and "U" for graduate level) as well. This informs the student that he/she is currently enrolled in the class and runs the risk of an unsatisfactory final grade provided proper procedures are not followed.

Report only students with unsatisfactory progress by using the following notations:

- Undergraduate students: record only "D" or "F" grades
- Graduate students: record only "C" or "U" grades

UNC Charlotte's International Festival takes place on Saturday, September 21, 2019, from 10am-6pm. The International Festival features booths arranged in a colorful marketplace style setting representing the cultures of over 30 nations. Many of them have food and arts and crafts for sale. There will be international music and dance on indoor and outdoor stages throughout the day. New for the first time this year will be Opera Carolina and the Charlotte Independence. Opera Carolina will appear on the Inside Stage at 11 am, singing famous arias from a variety of operas. The Charlotte Independence will give demonstrations from 10 am to 2 pm and will have a booth near the Game Zone, where attendees of all ages participate in and learn about the cultural significance of various games. Personally Speaking: Sport As Religion or Sport v. Religion



What do sports, politics and religion have in common? Find out as Personally Speaking looks at the sport-religion relationship in *The Eternal Present of Sport: Rethinking Sport and Religion* by Daniel Grano. The book considers the importance of religious images and ideas in contemporary sport controversies like performance enhancement, the head trauma crisis, and collegiate athletics' pay-for-play. Many believe sport is "religious," providing an escape from politics. Grano argues religion is a source of crisis and change in sport.

Apply to participate in the fall 2019 Ventureprise Launch National Science Foundation I-Corps cohort. The program provides UNC Charlotte faculty, staff and students with commercialization training

and up to an initial \$5000 in NSF funding. The goal of the program is to identify potential commercial uses and prepare for more substantial commercialization funding opportunities. The next stage is a six month \$50,000 NSF I-Corps Teams grant. The cohort will run October 11 through November 11. Applications due October 7.
