# **Entering Last Date of Attendance**

Keep in mind that beginning this spring semester, all instructors are required to enter the last date of attendance/participation for all students with failing (F) or unsatisfactory (U) grades. The last date of attendance is required to comply with federal student financial aid reporting requirements. #### 49er Rebound - Spring 2020 Updates

The 49er Rebound program assists first semester students on academic probation in returning to good academic standing during their second semester. The program is a collaboration between the University Center for Academic Excellence, undergraduate colleges, secondary advising centers, and Housing and Residence Life. Program participants are given several options to accommodate their individual needs, preferences, and scheduling constraints. For Spring 2020, these options include an academic success course (UCOL 1300), a structured discussion group (49er Focus), and a peer mentoring program (Students Obtaining Success).

Students who entered UNC Charlotte in the Summer or Fall of 2019 and are now on academic probation received a letter from their associate dean over break requiring them to attend a workshop in January to enroll in the program. The Northern Triangle of Central America, made up of Honduras, El Salvador, and Guatemala, is a special target of the administration, which hold the nations responsible for the large flow of migrants from Latin America to the U.S. With funds from the U.S. cut, how can the Northern Triangle countries curtail migration?"

UNC Charlotte's School of Data Science (formerly known as the Data Science Initiative) is hosting the third annual Women in Data Science Conference along with Lowe's on March 24, 2020. The Charlotte Women in Data Science (WiDS) Conference is a one-day event that aims to inspire, educate, and engage current and future data scientists in the Carolinas, regardless of gender, and to support women in the field by providing training, networking, and mentoring opportunities. WiDS Conference planners are currently searching for female thought leaders in academia to share their expert knowledge in data science or technology as speakers for the 2020 WiDS conference. Broad topic areas can include 'Developing Your Personal Brand', 'Applied Research: NLP and Social Media', 'Machine Learning and AI in the Cloud', or 'Applied Research: Data Visualization'. Submissions for speaker proposals are due January 31, 2020. Proposals must include the following items: a topic title, topic abstract, and short bio.
