Ventureprise Launches Social Impact Workshop and Competition

Do you or somebody you know want to make an impact in your community? On campus? In North Carolina? Solutions to social issues are powered by people with passion and motivation - and Ventureprise wants to empower you to find and pursue that passion. We have designed a simple, fast-paced workshop and challenge to help UNC Charlotte students work on social solutions - ChangeMaker Kickoff: Making an Impact.

The first phase of ChangeMaker Kickoff: Making an Impact is Breaking Ground. This four-hour workshop gives ANY UNC Charlotte student the opportunity to present and work on their idea and how they would like to make an impact. During this workshop, students will be given a challenge in which teams work together and think innovatively on ways to solve a problem they have identified and present their solution at the end of the evening. Challenge Advantage: Each student will be given a list of problems the week before the challenge and you are able to look over the list and brainstorm possible ideas to bring to your group the following week. If you already have a problem you want to solve, you will be able to submit it in the application for approval.

Second Phase: Finalists of Breaking Ground will be selected at the end of the Breaking Ground workshop and challenge. Following this challenge, finalists will receive two weeks of mentoring to work on their idea and solution.

Third Phase: Finalists will present their solution at the Charlotte Venture Challenge on April 8th, competing for cash and other prizes to launch their idea.

Research and Economic Development Announces Catalyst 2020

Research and Economic Development is pleased to announce details for the 2020 Catalyst Boot Camp.

Catalyst is a professional development and mentoring program to help faculty members successfully apply for grants from state and federal agencies, foundations and nonprofits. The goal of the program is to enhance the research and creative capacity of the University and institutionalize systemic support for the advancement and success of early- and mid-career faculty by: (1) providing comprehensive training in the preparation of competitive grant proposals, (2) establishing a peer mentoring program, and (3) creating a community of practice aimed at facilitating and promoting the engagement of diverse groups of faculty in disciplinary and interdisciplinary research and creative activity.

Beginning in 2020, the Catalyst Boot Camp program will feature two tracks that will run concurrently: Catalyst for STEM+ and Catalyst for the Arts and Humanities.

WINGS Scholarship

The WINGS (Women Initiating and Nurturing Growth through Scholarships) scholarship program is the sole philanthropic venture of Women Executives (WE), a Charlotte organization of professional women, and is managed under Women Executives for Community Service (WECS), a 501c3 non-profit organization. The WINGS scholarship program supports female college students age 25 and older who are pursuing a degree at a Charlotte institution. The WINGS Scholarship awards one or two \$5,000 scholarships each year that are renewable while the student is enrolled in at least nine credit hours at UNC Charlotte. Applicants must be non-traditional students who are entering their sophomore or junior year, with a strong preference to female students. The application deadline is April 1, 2020, and can be applied for through the NinerScholars Portal. UNC Charlotte faculty are requested to share information about the WINGS scholarship opportunity with students and to encourage eligible female students to apply.
