Gambrell Faculty Fellows Request for Proposals

The UNC Charlotte Urban Institute is looking for a new cohort of Gambrell Faculty Fellows. Now in its second year, the Gambrell Faculty Fellowship Program is a grants program for UNC Charlotte faculty funded by The Gambrell Foundation. The Fellowship Program funds short-term research projects (up to 18 months) examining issues related to economic mobility in the Charlotte region. This year, the program is particularly interested in the intersection of economic mobility and the impact of the novel coronavirus. Up to five fellowships will be awarded this year. Proposed projects can have a maximum budget of \$15,000. The deadline for submissions is 5:00 p.m. on Friday, June 15, 2020. The grant period will begin August 15, 2020.
