Designing Effective Online Courses: An Online Workshop for UNC System Faculty and Staff

After overwhelming demand (1,800+ faculty) for the initial offerings of Designing Effective Online Courses, an online workshop to support faculty and staff across the System in moving their courses to an online format, the UNC System Office has announced two more sessions of the online workshop for the fall semester. The workshop is free, but space is limited, and registration is required. Learn more and register.

Who Should Attend: This workshop will provide faculty and staff with information, tools, and experiences that will help them to be more successful—and more comfortable—teaching online. Because time is of the essence, the UNC System Division of Academic Affairs, and its Digital Learning Initiative, have designed this workshop to focus on the most essential topics any faculty member will need to move their courses online quickly and effectively. The material will be aimed at instructors who have minimal proficiency leading online learning environments, but experienced instructors will also find new tips, hot topics, and useful activities.

When: The next sessions of this workshop begin on October 5 and then again on November 30. Based on feedback from previous participants, there will be a two-week and a four-week pacing of the course for the October session and only a two week pacing for the November session. Participants can finish the work at their own pace, but they are encouraged to complete the course within the two or four week time frames in order to take advantage of the opportunity to collaborate with other faculty members.

- 1. An interactive, hands-on, workshop approach
- 2. A chance to create and build usable course assets throughout the workshop
- 3. The opportunity to experience online teaching best practices from the student perspective
- 4. A model of flexible course design that provides ample time for collaboration while also allowing participants to set their own pace

Harshini V. de Silva Graduate Mentor Award

Nominations will be accepted through November 6 for the 2021 Harshini V. de Silva Graduate Mentor Award. The award recognizes a full-time member of the graduate faculty who displays outstanding graduate mentoring. This award was established in memory of Dr. Harshini de Silva, an associate professor of biology, noted for her dedication to the academic and professional development of graduate students. The award, which includes a crystal obelisk, a framed citation and a cash prize, will be presented in the spring semester at a ceremony and reception presided over by the Chancellor, the

First Citizens Bank Scholars Medal

Nominations for the 2021 First Citizens Bank Scholars Medal for outstanding scholarship, creativity and research will be accepted through November 13. The award, which includes a cash prize, framed citation and a medal, will be presented in the spring semester at a ceremony and reception presided over by the Chancellor, officials of First Citizens Bank, the Dean of the Graduate School and University officers. Any full-time faculty member may be nominated and nominations may come from any UNC Charlotte faculty member. The First Citizens Bank Scholars Medal has been awarded since 1988 with last year's award going to Dr. James Walsh, Department of Political Science and Public Administration, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. Faculty Recruitment Training

This training, which is required for faculty who intend to serve on a faculty search committee, has a new name – Best Practices for Inclusive Faculty Hiring. The training hasn't changed, just the name. A reminder -- the first part of the training is an online session in Canvas which covers forms, processes and other details. Search committee members will complete this online session each academic year they serve on a search committee. Faculty can complete this session at their own pace, at a time they choose. There is a short quiz after the session which faculty must take and receive a score of at least 70% before they have completed the online section of the training. The second part is the face-to-face session which search committee members are required to have completed within the past five years PRIOR to their service on a search committee. 2021-2022 Faculty Research Grants Program

The Faculty Research Grants Committee is soliciting proposals for the 2021-2022 Faculty Research Grants (FRG) Program. Each individual project may have a maximum budget of \$8,000, including a stipend of up to \$4,200. Faculty

submitting joint proposals may request up to \$16,000 (\$8,000 per faculty member). Guidelines and application forms are available online at <u>FRG Guidelines and Forms</u>. The deadline for submissions is 5:00 p.m. on Monday, October 19, 2020.
