Community Talk to Discuss Confederate Monuments and the Ongoing Fight for Racial Justice

Join Karen L. Cox in conversation on her book *No Common Ground: Confederate Monuments and the Ongoing Fight for Racial Justice*. The <u>virtual talk</u> will be held April 22 from 5:30-7 p.m. In partnership with UNC Press, facilitators include Dr.

Willie J. Griffin, staff historian at the Levine Museum of the New South, and Emily Gunzburger Makas, associate professor of architectural and urban history in the School of Architecture at UNC Charlotte.

Virtual STEM Summit

Promoting Educational Reform in STEM at the Course, Department, and Institutional Level

The keynote speaker for the summit is Dr. Paula Lemons, Professor in the Department of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology at the University of Georgia. The COVID-19 pandemic and heightened attention to systemic racism have highlighted the fact that outdated teaching practices can stunt student learning and trust of science, maintain systemic biases, and prevent equitable education. Institutions can dismantle these problems, and rebuild equitable and just systems through collective action among instructors, administrators, and change agents. This talk will describe a transformation project that aims to shift the University towards new core commitments for education. The summit is open to the campus community and is supported by Transforming STEM Teaching and Learning Academy, Center for Teaching and Learning and the Office of Undergraduate Education.
