If you answered 'yes' to any of these questions, then consider submitting a seminar proposal idea for the Charlotte Teachers Institute (CTI) lineup of 2022 seminars. CTI is an educational partnership among UNC Charlotte, Johnson C. Smith University, and Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools (CMS) to strengthen teaching and learning through collaboration, creativity, leadership, and content knowledge. CMS teachers in grades PK-12 apply to participate in professor-led seminars based on research and teaching interests with the goal of creating original curricula for CMS students. To date, 700+ CTI Fellows have written more than 1,045 original curriculum units, all available on CTI's website. CAPS Virtual Workshop: Supporting Student Mental Health During the Campus Return

The Fall 2021 semester will likely pose challenges for our students as they continue to deal with the continued global pandemic and ongoing identity-based violence and oppression. This 60-minute virtual workshop, hosted by CAPS, shares practical ways faculty and staff can support student mental health in the return to campus, with additional focus on those with historically marginalized identities (e.g., Black, LGBTQ+, international). Learn ways to proactively attend to student mental health, promote inclusion and belonging, and respond to student mental health concerns as they arise.
