Mobile Hotspot Lending Program

Atkins Library now has Verizon mobile hotspot devices to loan to students. The library was awarded two grants to purchase hotspots to help level the academic playing field for many students, particularly for those for whom internet connectivity is a barrier. Please share this information with any UNC Charlotte student who:

- cannot afford to cover internet service costs on their own,
- does not have broadband internet access in their homes due to where they are geographically located, or
- requires additional options due to internet traffic congestion either in the home or neighborhood driving down connectivity speeds.

Students can borrow a mobile hotspot from the library's first-floor Information and Research Desk. The loan period is seven days with the option to renew two times.

Sign Up for Mentoring Workshop Series from ADVANCE FADO

The ADVANCE Faculty Affairs and Diversity Office will be offering a series of eight virtual workshops, "Developing Successful Mentoring Strategies," in the spring semester. The workshops are based on the curriculum from the Center for the Improvement of the Mentored Experience in Research (CIMER) at the University of Wisconsin. CIMER's research mentor training is an evidence-based, interactive approach designed to help mentors develop skills for engaging in productive, culturally responsive, research mentoring relationships, which optimize the success of both mentors and mentees. We encourage all faculty, particularly new faculty who will be mentoring undergraduates, graduate students or post-doctoral fellows, to participate in this training. Participation in all eight sessions addresses the NIGMS guidelines regarding the preparation of mentors involved in training grants. Feedback from faculty who have participated in this training has been overwhelmingly positive. The workshops will be presented every two weeks at the same time, beginning

Who's Steering the Author Ship?: Introducing the Authorship Policy & Resolution Procedures

Presented by: Sam Sears, Associate Vice Chancellor and Deputy General Counsel; Amy Kelso, Senior Associate General Counsel; and Lisa Rasmussen, Professor of Philosophy and Graduate School Faculty Fellow

The presenters will discuss the new University Policy 318, "Authorship Policy and Resolution Procedures," established in May 2021. This policy is intended to support good authorship processes and address potential disputes, and it is part of the University's commitment to fostering a culture of transparency, openness, and research integrity. The presenters will discuss authorship principles and constructive authorship practices as well as dispute resolution procedures through hypotheticals and practical examples.

University Policies Related to Records Handling and Storage

University Policy: 101.8, Personnel Records

State law protects the confidentiality of employee personnel records and also provides guidance for the proper handling of employee personnel records by UNC Charlotte as a public institution. University Policy 101.8 defines what is considered a personnel record, where such records may be located, and their retention schedule. Additionally, the policy addresses persons permitted access to such records and their responsibility for maintaining confidentiality in handling and accessing them. Please take an opportunity to review University Policy: 101.8, Personnel Records and take time to ensure the proper storing and handling of personnel records, including those of faculty associated with reappointment, promotion and tenure. Please discuss this policy with all employees approved for access to handle these records.

University Policy: 402, Student Education Records (FERPA)

Federal law protects the confidentiality of records relating directly to a student and also provides guidance for the proper handling of records by UNC Charlotte as a public institution. University Policy 402 defines what is considered a student record and where such records may be located. Additionally, the policy addresses persons permitted access to such records and their responsibility for maintaining confidentiality in handling and accessing them. Please take an opportunity to review University Policy: 402, Student Education Records (FERPA). Chapters 121 and 132 of the General Statutes of

North Carolina governs the retention and disposition of student related records. The UNC System Office provides minimum retention standards for the handling of student records in the <u>UNC Records Retention and Disposition Schedule</u>. Please take time to ensure the proper storing, handling, retention, and disposition of student related records. Please discuss this policy and schedule with all employees approved for access to handle these records.

Pilot of Digital Degree Planning Tool

This Spring 2022 term, we will be piloting a digital Degree Planning tool that is a feature of Degree Works. All advisors will see a Plans tab at the top of the Degree Works audit. However, this will not be turned on for all students. We are limiting the Plans tab only to undergraduate 49er Rebound students targeted for the pilot. A select group of advisors will be participating in the pilot. Additional advisors are welcome to explore the features within the planning tool but are not expected to participate in using the planner for this term. We will be offering training sessions for advisors participating in the pilot before we launch the planning to participating students.
