Personally Speaking Event Examines the Erasure of Blackness

"There are no Blacks here. They disappeared." Black erasure continues to shape and mold anti-blackness. Argentinians offer an interesting example of anti-blackness because, in contrast with other Latin American countries that embrace a more mixed heritage, they take pride in their European roots. UNC Charlotte Department of History faculty member Erika Denise Edwards contends that Black women—concubines, wives, mothers, and daughters—are instrumental in understanding the construction of race in Argentina. She argues that these women strategically escaped the stigma of their blackness by recategorizing their racial identities as "white." Edwards delves into the intimate lives of Black women, tracing the origins of the popular mischaracterization of a "black disappearance" and demonstrating how these women shaped their own destinies.
