Fall 2022 Common Reading Experience Selection

The Ground Breaking: An American City and Its Search for Justice by Scott Ellsworth has been selected as UNC Charlotte's Common Reading Experience text for fall 2022. A riveting and essential new book, *The Ground Breaking* not only tells the long-suppressed story of the notorious Tulsa race massacre, it also unearths the lost history of how the massacre was covered up, and of the courageous individuals who fought to keep the story alive. Most important, it recounts the ongoing archeological saga and the search for the unmarked graves of the victims of the massacre, and of the fight to win restitution for the survivors and their families. We are excited to see this text adopted in courses that teach both first-year and continuing students. In addition to an author visit, there will be discussion groups and activities planned through the fall term to build upon the book's themes. You should also submit the book to the campus bookstore as a required text for any course in which you will be using it.

The Common Reading Experience at UNC Charlotte provides a shared academic experience to assist first-year students in their transition to the university. The program offers opportunity for self-reflection, critical thinking, student interaction, and understanding of diverse perspectives.

The Belk College of Business is fondly remembering <u>Stephen A. Jolly</u>, an award-winning faculty member who left a lasting impact on thousands of accounting students during his 26-year tenure. Dr. Jolly, who taught accounting from 1975-2001, passed away on February 2. In 1980, he received the NCNB (now Bank of America) Award for Teaching Excellence, one of the University's highest honors.

Nominations Open for Honors Faculty Appointment

Each spring, the Honors College invites nominations to the Honors Faculty. Faculty may apply directly via the Nomination Form; the Honors College will handle the nomination request with the department chair. If you are already a member of the Honors Faculty and your five-year term is expiring, you will receive an email about applying for reappointment. Applications for both appointment and reappointment are reviewed by the Honors Council, which makes recommendations to the Executive Director of the Honors College. Please consider nominating/renewing Honors Faculty membership if you have: taught an honors course in your department, college, or the Honors College; provided service to honors in your department, college, or the Honors College; or acted as a thesis/project advisor or mentor for an honors student. Activities such as these make a likely case for appointment as Honors Faculty. Nominations are due April 10. Appointments begin July 1. Terms are five-year, renewable.
