Shawn Long Legacy Fund

Colleagues and friends of Dr. Shawn Long, who passed away on January 14, 2021, have created an endowed fund to recognize his contributions to UNC Charlotte and to student success. Shawn came to UNC Charlotte as an assistant professor of Communication Studies and Organizational Science in 2000, was promoted through the ranks, became department chair, associate dean, and then senior associate dean. He left UNC Charlotte in 2019 to take on the position of Dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at Kennesaw State, now the Norman J. Radow College of Humanities and Social Sciences. In particular, this fund will allow Shawn's memory to live on through two of the undergraduate and the graduate programs he founded and stewarded during his time as both a faculty member, department chair, and then associate dean. These include the Organizational Science Summer Institute, which focuses on expanding diversity among students in the field, and the Multicultural Doctoral Summer Teaching Fellowship Program, which provides professional training workshops and teaching experience for doctoral candidates from the humanities, social sciences and sciences. Both programs recruit students from across the nation in an effort to support their scholarly success when they return to their home institution. More information.

Revised Timeline for CLAS Review

In October 2021, Chancellor Gaber presented the Committee on CLAS Review with a charge to review all possible options for the organization of the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences, from the present organization to internal changes or even the creation of a new college. The committee was expected to identify strengths and weaknesses associated with each option; to identify how each option aligns with the strategic plan; and to prepare a summary report. The Committee is distributing a draft of the summary report and requests feedback on further considerations and ideas that should be examined in advance of finalizing the report.
