# Alice Tate Lecture Series: Jewish Diversity and "Jews of Color"

Lewis R. Gordon, an Afro-Jewish public intellectual, academic, and musician, will speak on the historical diversity of Jewish people, the impact of racialization on Jewish identity, and the supportive and critical ways of interpreting the expression "Jews of color." He teaches at University of Connecticut, where he is Professor and Head of the Philosophy Department, with affiliations in many academic units, including Caribbean Studies and Jewish Studies. He lectures and is involved in political and artistic projects across the globe and holds appointments in South Africa, Jamaica, India, and France. These include founding programs such as The Second Chance Program and organizations and centers ranging from the Caribbean Philosophical Association and the Center for Afro-Jewish Studies to, most recently, the Philosophy and Global Affairs Group. He is the author of many books for which he has received accolades, which include the Gustavus Myers Outstanding Book Award for Outstanding Work on Human Rights in North America. His most recent books are Freedom, Justice, and Decolonization (Routledge, 2021) and Fear of Black Consciousness (New York: Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2022; London: Penguin Books, 2022), which was listed on Literary Hub's Most Anticipated Books of 2022. He is this year's recipient of the Eminent Scholar Award from the Global Development Studies division of the International Studies Association.

# **Nexus: Networking Across the Disciplines**

As we seek to "foster and grow collaborations across disciplines within UNC Charlotte" (University Strategic Plan, Objective 5.1) and build on the momentum of the Top-Tier Research Commission process, faculty from different departments, programs, and colleges need structured opportunities to learn about one another's research and to brainstorm areas of mutual interest. By facilitating such networking, Nexus aims to foster the emergence of interdisciplinary research teams and support the initial stages of project development as they formulate shared research questions, consider analytical strategies, and identify potential funding sources. Nexus centers on two full-day workshops May 18 and August 15, with working groups expected to brainstorm ideas over the summer. The pilot program in 2022 will target faculty in two research areas of focus and distinction: 1) Migration and Diaspora Studies; and 2) Climate Change and Resilience. Applications are due by 5:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 20 (information and application). Each faculty member in the Nexus program will receive a \$1,000 stipend for participating fully in both workshops. Nexus is organized by the Office of Interdisciplinary Studies with support from the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences, the Cato College of Education, the American Studies program, and the Department of Geography and Earth Sciences.
